The Founders of the Australian Bahá'í Community

The founders of the Australian Bahá'í community were John Henry Hyde Dunn (1855-1941) and Clara Dunn (1869-1960), who arrived in Sydney on steamship S.S. Sonoma from the United States on 10 April 1920.

Hyde Dunn was an Englishman who had emigrated to the United States. Clara Dunn was born in London to Irish parents and raised in Canada. They married in 1917, late in life, after their first partners had passed away. Both Hyde and Clara Dunn had embraced the Bahá'í Faith in the United States in the early years of the twentieth century. They both met 'Abdu'l-Bahá, then head of the Bahá'í Faith, in San Francisco during his historic visit to the US and Canada in 1912. He made an impact on them that lasted for the rest of their lives.

The Dunns were inspired by 'Abdu'l-Bahá to travel across the world to found a new religious community based on the teachings of Baha'u'llah. He supported their decision to move to Australia, writing to them in December 1920: "This journey is pregnant with greater prosperity, because great results will issue therefrom. At present it is full of hardship, but later on favour, comfort and happiness will be bestowed."

At the time of their arrival, Hyde was aged 65 and Clara 51. They were not wealthy, and knew no-one in Australia. The qualities of courage, faith, persistence and audacity sustained them.

Hyde Dunn found employment as a travelling salesman for the Bacchus Marsh Milk Company, soon acquired by Nestle. His work took him across the country, travelling mainly by train, and by 1923 he had visited 225 towns. He worked for Nestle for nearly 12 years, travelling to every state and major city and town in Australia.

An engaging speaker who never lost his English accent, he spoke about the Bahá'í teachings wherever he went: in churches, at events organised



by social and philosophical movements, and in private homes. He had a friendly disposition and a distinguished, upright appearance. He was described by Shoghi Effendi, who had been appointed the Guardian and head of the Bahá'í Faith following the passing of 'Abdu'l-Bahá in 1921, as "great-hearted and heroic".

Clara Dunn often accompanied her husband in his travels, hosting guests and giving public talks herself. She also engaged in charity work. In 1932 she travelled to the Holy Land on pilgrimage, where she met Shoghi Effendi, with whom she and her husband had corresponded regularly for a decade. On her return, Shoghi Effendi wrote: "The services which both of you have rendered, and are still rendering, to the Faith, are engraved upon the tablet of my heart. Nothing can efface their trace or dim their memory."

Following the passing of Hyde Dunn in 1941, Clara continued to serve the growing Bahá'í community with great vigour, travelling frequently to visit and encourage Bahá'ís across the country until she was well into her 80s.

In 1952, both Clara and Hyde Dunn were designated as Hands of the Cause, the highest honour that could be bestowed on an individual Bahá'í. Clara Dunn made her final visit to the Holy Land in 1957, in her late eighties, to attend the Conclave of the Hands of the Cause following the passing of Shoghi Effendi. She passed away in 1960 at the age of 91. She was buried alongside her husband at Woronora Memorial Park in Sutherland, Sydney.

To the community they founded, they will always be remembered as "Mother and Father Dunn".

Australian Bahá'í House of Worship

The Bahá'í House of Worship was conceived and constructed for the worship of God, independent of our notions of race, nation, class or creed. That is why its services offer selections from the various Sacred Writings and not from sectarian literature. There is no ritualism or set form.

Bahá'ís have no professional clergy. The auditorium of the House of Worship is open to all people for prayer and meditation.

There are no collections. Only Bahá'ís are allowed to contribute to the Bahá'í funds and consider it a spiritual privilege to do so. Their contributions are both voluntary and confidential.

The Sydney Bahá'í House of Worship, dedicated in 1961, is a unique architectural development: nine-sided with nine entrances, it symbolises the gathering together of all mankind, irrespective of race, religion, nation or class. The grounds are a wild flower sanctuary. The seats in the central part of the auditorium face the Holy Land. Above the head of the worshippers in the apex of the dome, in Arabic calligraphy, is an invocation depicting the Greatest Name translated as

"O Glory of the All-Glorious"
